

Pastor's Report

I pray that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love," Ephesians 3: 16-17

Some significant events from 2019:

- 1) **Bethel Reforming** shaped the beginning of 2019 in many significant ways. Through conversation, study, and prayer, Bethel embraced a 2020 vision that implemented changes in staff, organization, and ministry focus. This was made particularly difficult as our Director of Youth and Family Faith Formation, Bryan Jaster, made the decision to move to Colorado and accept a similar role at a church in Denver, in large measure due to these decisions. Other changes of significance: Pat Shields began an enhanced role as Parish Administrator, George Donovan became Director of Music accompanied by Sue Correll becoming Associate Director of Music, Kim Williams became the Congregation Treasurer, along with her role as our bookkeeper. These changes in the work and emphasis of the staff have been bittersweet, as we have had to say goodbye to dear friends but also recognize a smoother and streamlined ministry organization. With change comes struggle. And with change comes new vision and blessings. We've experienced both this year.
- 2) After the summer, we made the decision to remain with **one worship service** at 9:30am. This has been well received for the most part. Plans for a new Wednesday evening worship service were pushed back to 2020 (which has begun with our WOW Worship on Wednesdays experience). A full sanctuary, with full ensemble and musicians have been a welcome joy during the fall.
- 3) During the fall, we held a Fall Discipleship Launch called "Back2Basics: UP, IN, and OUT". I believe that helping our congregation refocus on the "basics" of worship, community, and outreach is where we will find new life and joy in moving forward.
- 4) We fixed the Underground which had significant mold issues. While this took up our excess funds originally allocated for a sanctuary sound system, etc., it has been a benefit. We look forward to seeing how we remake the Underground in 2020.
- 5) The implementation of our Coffee with Council has been a real blessing for both transparency reasons and as an avenue for regular, active communication with our congregation. I am thankful for the leadership of the Council in this area.

<u>Some statistics</u>: We received **16 new members** in 2019, including **5** baptisms. Our membership is **445** and our average worship attendance was **176**. Moving to one service in the fall certainly affected this average. With the addition of our WOW (Worship on Wednesdays) service beginning, I anticipate this average to grow in 2020. Ash Wednesday was 114, our Midweek Lenten services averaged 54, Maundy Thursday was 54, and Good Friday was 106. Easter attendance was **331**. Our Advent services averaged 25 and we had **674** between Christmas in a Barn (475) and our Candlelight communion service (189).

I am so appreciative of our staff. **Terri Hollingsworth**, **Kim Williams**, and **Pat Shields** are gifted and faithful and through their ample talents keep the office and ministries of Bethel running efficiently and joyfully.

I am so thankful for **George Donovan** and **Sue Correll**, who have been instrumental in continuing the excellence of our worship and music ministry. While we had to say goodbye to our dear friends, and Shenandoah students, Jacob Pembleton (Bass) and Libby Geller (Clarinet), we are thankful that we now have Charlene Romano (Flute) and Alex Kimble (Bass) serving with us from Shenandoah.

Edie McGoff, Patty White, Cliff Crowder, Gretchen and Matt Meade are valuable team members whose efforts behind-the-scenes help to make Bethel thrive! We couldn't do what we do without them.

I would also like to thank our Bethel Council for their leadership this year 2019. **Traci Shoberg** has been an incredible President. She faithfully navigated the difficult early months of 2019 and I couldn't be prouder of her leadership. Along with the rest of the Executive Team (**Julie Shanabrook**, **Rose Pierce**, and **Tom Milburn**), our council leadership has been phenomenal this year!

Likewise, the rest of the council members served so ably during 2019 as Board Chairs: **Liz Whitaker** (Congregational Life), **Beth Garner** (Servant), **Vonda Wilt** (Prayer and Care), **Mike Asmussen** (Learning), and **John Fredericksen** (Ministry Support).

2019 was as difficult a year as I have ever had in the ministry. We made difficult decisions while seeking to chart a new path. Still, despite some painful moments and uncertainty, 2019 brought with it tremendous blessings as well, of which I am grateful.

As we prepare to celebrate our 200th Anniversary in 2020, I pray that the leadership and strength we've show during tough times will serve us well as we embrace the NEW and the NOW together.

I end with a sincere and heartfelt *Thank you* for all the ways that you have gone above and beyond to help support Bethel as we strive always to be a community growing deeper in faith and wider in love!

Music Ministry

When I returned to Winchester in late 2018, I had no idea that 2019 would lead me back to the wonderful, **PASSIONATE** people of Bethel Lutheran Church. I give thanks to each of you for the opportunity and privilege to lead our Music Ministry which includes some of the most **PASSIONATE** folks I have ever known. The Holy Spirit has truly been at work amongst us and continues to lead us forward as partners in ministry together.

Some highlights of 2019 in our Music and Worship ministry included the changing of our Music Staffing. What an honor it is to work with the gifts of Sue Correll, Pastor Dave, our talented musicians and singers as we have begun a new season of ministry together. In early 2019, we began evaluating what our Music Ministry looks like today and how we can shape it moving forward with a commitment to offering consistent, vibrant, meaningful music offerings weekly. We discerned how the gifts of each of us could contribute to this vision and I am excited to see our music ministry truly begin to take on a fresh shape as we move into 2020 and beyond, continually fueled by **PASSION**.

Sue Correll's role has shifted to a focus on creating opportunities for our children and reviving our Handbell Choirs—areas she is highly skilled in and **PASSIONATE** about. Weekly, Sue meets with our students to sing and learn songs to share in worship gatherings at various times throughout the year. This past year was capped by the wonderful Sunday School Christmas Pageant held the Sunday before Christmas.

Sue has also been working behind the scenes planning and preparing for the re-launch of our handbell and handchime choir. We have the opportunity to borrow 7 octaves of handbells from a local church which currently is not using them. An adult group is currently forming with rehearsals beginning in February 2020 on Thursday evenings from 6:00 pm to 6:50 pm in the Music Room. There is room for anyone who wants to join this fun group! No musical training is required as Sue will teach you everything you need to know. All you need is a little **PASSION!** We hope to also offer an opportunity soon for our children to participate in bell playing.

Sue also assists in accompanying our Worship Ensemble and making our pipe organ sing in worship. She is such a gift and I am thrilled that we can add the organ to the overall Ensemble sound—a contemporary way to include a more traditional instrument in our blended worship gatherings.

Our worship ensemble shares their **PASSION** for music leading our congregation in song weekly. In August, we said farewell to Libby Beller (Clarinet) and Jacob Pendleton (Bass), who joined our Ensemble as Shenandoah Scholarship Students. In September we were blessed to add the gifts of Charlene Romano (Flute) and Alex Kimble (Bass) to the ensemble. It is because of your generous gifts to the *Jones/Joyner Music Fund* that we are able to give a small token of appreciation to our scholarship musicians. Their **PASSION** for music is a blessing to us and your **PASSION** for them is a blessing to them. Through the *Jones/Joyner Music Fund* we are also able to add additional musicians for special services and events such as strings, brass and additional woodwinds as we have for Good Friday, Easter, Christmastime and more! Thank you for your continued support of this fund.

A major goal for 2020 is fundraising for a new piano for the Sanctuary. Our current instrument has served our congregation for nearly 40 years and is getting to an age where it is becoming costly to maintain. Our goal is to raise \$25,000 towards the purchase of a new grand piano which will serve us for many years to come. If you would like to contribute to this, please mark your donation "88 Keys". As we celebrate our 200th anniversary as a congregation, we will celebrate with some special music concert events later this year. We will continue to lead with **PASSION** as we gather to worship. There is always room for more **PASSIONATE** people to join any portion of our music ministry. If you are sensing this call, come join us as we anticipate another exciting year of ministry together to our congregation and community.

Parish Administrator's Report

2019 was a year of change. During the first quarter, Council received specific recommendations from a previously appointed sub-committee that had been charged with reviewing Bethel's organization, staffing and operations. On April 1st, following detailed discussions and debate, Council transmitted a "Staff and Organizational Changes" letter to the congregation.

One of Council's key decisions involved the creation of a newly defined Parish Administrator position and appointment (myself), together with the sharing, with Terri Hollingsworth, of a 32-hour week Parish Office function, responsible for the coordination and management of all administrative, communication, space utilization and congregational ministry activities.

Another critical decision was the appointment of a Personnel Committee, which was charged with overseeing the a) development of staff member position descriptions, b) establishing Staff Member goals and objectives and, c) designing and implementing a performance evaluation system.

I am pleased to report that we have done well in achieving our objectives that were initiated, including:

- After completing an incoming phone call study, implemented revised Parish Office hours (9 a.m. 1 p.m., Monday through Thursday).
- Held separate congregational meetings for Ministry Celebration Sunday (formerly Stewardship Sunday) and the November Congregational Meeting in order to provide individual focus on ministries (a Ministry Fair) and financial topics (proposed Ministry Spending Plan).
- Revised and updated the Staff Member Handbook (dormant for over ten years).
- Revised position titles and descriptions for all Staff Members.
- Established 2020 goals and objectives for all Staff Members.
- Worked with the Personnel Committee designing and implementing a Performance Evaluation System for 2020.
- In conjunction with Kim Williams (Parish Bookkeeper and Treasurer), developed a Staff Position Profile document, incorporating all the specific details for each unique position and Staff Member. They will be distributed to Staff Members in early 2020.
- Implemented a standard Planning and Execution process form for all Congregational Events.
- Implemented a standard Easy Critique form for all Congregational Events.
- Organized a Safety and Security Committee, which met, developed and with Council's approval, published and implemented Bethel's first Safety and Security Policy.
- Terri Hollingsworth (Parish Administrative Assistant) commenced documenting Parish Office activities in a Desk Reference Manual that will provide centrally located source material for contacts, processes, "how-to" information, etc. In 2020, this type of documentation for our Staff Member functions will be expanded to other areas of our operation, including facilities, custodial services and nursery/childcare.
- Issued monthly/periodic reports of Estimate of Giving, Members and Friends Directory updates, Sunday School, VBS program, ministries, etc.

In closing, your church Staff Members have worked diligently and together as a team throughout 2019 to achieve significant progress in creating more organization, planning and focus to the multitude of activities that occur in the day-to-day operations of Bethel. We will continue in this direction during 2020.

Every 3 weeks Bright Futures gets a giant pallet of juice pouches from Kraft that arrive sticky on the outside and need to be wiped/cleaned off before distribution to schools. WATTS- Bethel's WATTs week came early this year, December 7-14. Early in the week, we welcomed 30-32 guests. We crept closer to capacity (35) from Wednesday through Friday evening. As we have seen in previous years, our own congregation and volunteers from our partnering churches worked side by side to provide a warm, comfortable space and yummy meals. 107 volunteers logged 310 hours throughout the week. Harvest Sunday- Bethel's 18th annual Harvest Sunday landed on a sunny August morning! Celebrating God's bounty with our Bethel family, we shared pies, garden produce, baked goods, crafts and flowers in support of Harvest Sunday and Lutheran World Relief! This years donations and purchases supported LWR's Mission: "Affirming God's love for all people, we work with Lutherans and partners around the world to end poverty, injustice and human suffering." We were able to contribute \$1853.00 to Lutheran World Relief on behalf of refugee programs as well as \$200.00 from zucchini relish sales to benefit Refugym, a nonprofit NGO serving refugees in Greece.

There are 70.8 million forcibly displaced people worldwide. They include internally displaced peoples, refugees, and asylum seekers. The refugee crisis has reached the highest level in recorded history, surpassing the totals last seen in World War II. In addition to war and ethnic, tribal and religious violence, the reality of climate change now forces people to walk away, quite literally sometimes, from all that they know. Two-thirds of all refugees worldwide come from just five countries: Syria, Afghanistan, South Sudan, Myanmar and Somalia. Turkey is currently the leading host of refugees, with 3.5 million, followed by Uganda and Pakistan, which both host about 1.4 million; the US will only resettle 21,292 refugees this year. In a globalized world, sharing global responsibility for global issues is the fair thing to do. Thank you for supporting the vision of LWR: Empowered by God's unconditional love in Jesus Christ, we envision a world in which each person, every community and all generations live in justice, dignity and peace. — Julie Shanabrook Team Leader

She went on to receive a master's degree from Brandeis University. Neema reached out to Bethel in November seeking assistance with travel and visa needs. The team is proud to help a strong and intelligent "warrior" on her path the help build a better future in Tanzania.

Our Global Christmas fundraiser raised \$4680.00 that will go directly to our mission partners in Tanzania, the Philippines, Guatemala and India, and pay for food, educational supplies, and heath care for those in great need. Thanks to all who participated.

Finally, Howard and Earlene Kemnitz are planning a trip to visit with Concordia Children's Services in Manila in April 2020.

Thanks to all who supported the youth trip and our mission partners through love, prayers, and sharing of blessing. Ministry Support 2019

Property upkeep – The property upkeep team had a very intense year. Water damage in the "Underground" area necessitated a major removal of damaged materials, equipment, and walls. Significant cleaning was conducted, and water infiltration issues addressed professionally, along with substantial landscaping and dehumidification improvements. It is now ready for action by Bethel leadership decisionmakers and voluntary renovators.

Bethel also sustained major damages to on-site trees due to wind and snow. Bethel volunteers spent hours cleaning up the mess, fortunately without injury. Bethel volunteers also spent considerable time repairing broken and failing thermoshield windows around the building. Bethel also acquired some additional help via volunteers who have "adopted" various small areas to take personal charge to weed and replace mulch as needed. We can use more!

Furniture set-up/take-down – Bethel's volunteer facility adaptors spent hours and hours preparing spaces for the various groupings of people we serve, often with little or no recognition. However, they seem to have the most fun, as they get workouts and a chance to visit as they work organizing tables and chairs. They also went through chairs and tables using up hundreds of screws and a bit of welding rod to make needed repairs.

Weekly offering counter – The counting team carried out their work quietly and accurately again this year. They pride themselves on being accurate, respectful, and confidential.

Closing building – The building closing team has been very successful, making sure that the building is secure when unoccupied and safe when it is occupied. They installed new locks in most outside doors and developed a new safety and security team which has created a new policy for managing building use and safety.
